Scripture says, For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city that is to come (Heb. 13:14). It also says, for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal (2 Cor. 4:18). Matthew 24:35 "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away!"

There are some things that we have grown up with but will disappear and be replaced with new, modern technology! Here are a few of those things.....



BOOKS By the end of this decade, digital formats for tablets and e-readers will displace physical books. Digital texts figure to yield more bang for the buck than today's textbooks. Interactive soft wear will test younger pupil's mastery of basic skills such as arithmetic and create customized lesson plans based on their responses. Older students till be able to take digital notes and even simulate chemistry experiments when brick and mortar labs aren't handy.

The Moldboard Plow Modern farmers have little use for it. It provides a deep tillage that turns up too much soil, encouraging erosion because the plow leaves no plant material on the surface to stop wind and rain water from carrying the soil away. It also requires a huge amount of diesel fuel to plow, compared with other tillage methods, cutting into farmers' profits. The final straw: It releases more carbon dioxide into the air than other tillage methods.



KEYS at least in the sense of a piece of brass cut to a specific shape, are going away. But for getting into your house (and your car), the technology that will kill off the key is your smart phone. Connecting either via Bluetooth or the Internet, your mobile device will be programmed to lock and unlock doors at home, at the office and elsewhere. A variety of "connected car" services such as Audi Connect and GM's OnStar already let you unlock and lock the car remotely and even start it with a phone app

The traditional incandescent lightbulb that traces its roots back to Thomas Edison is definitely on its way out. As of January 1, 2014, the manufacture and importation of 40- to 100-watt incandescent bulbs became illegal in the U.S., part of a much broader effort to get Americans to use less electricity.



Cash, Check books, credit cards and ATMs: Soon, you will have all your banking done through any mobile device — even your vehicle.

Across the U.S., check use fell 57 percent from 2000 to 2012, according to the Federal Reserve. Ninety-four percent of consumers under 35-years-old bank online, and more than one-fifth of them have never written a physical check to pay a bill. In the more distant future, there will be no cash. No cash means no cash machines — bye, bye ATMs.

NYANHIAL REEK YOA

Interview and story by Anne Breuker

Nyanhial (pronounced Nan Yell) was born in the Southern part of Sudan during times of civil unrest and violence. When South Sudan declared it's independence in 2011, she was already in the United States.

She came here with her husband in 1999 at the age of 19, living first in Maine and New Hampshire. Later they were encouraged by an uncle to move to Minnesota at Mankato and then Worthington. She is the mother of six children, the youngest, a baby

girl born September 14, 2017. The baby's name is Kouthathin which means "God Loves You". Nyanhial still struggles with our language, but has found work at JBS.



Her home is decorated with colorful beadwork, shells, mementos from her home land and precious family pictures. In the picture, Nyanhial is surrounded by her family, her sister from Maine who was visiting, and a child who was with them for the afternoon. Her life style is a mixture of American and Sudanese, with food and clothing from both countries. Her lovely Sudanese dresses are made by a seamstress in Mankato and her oldest daughter does the braid work in her hair

Nyanhial has been back to South Sudan to visit her mother and family there. Her mother has since moved to Kenya to escape the unrest in South Sudan. She misses her mother and wishes her mother could see her family and her children could see their grandmother. She is able to visit her mother by phone and they exchange pictures by phone as well. The church there is active, supporting widows, orphans and refugees in South Sudan, Kenya and Ethiopia

Nyanhial loves to read the stories of Jesus in the Gospels and the account at Pentecost found in Acts. She uses her Sudanese Bible and the hymn book she brought with her from Sudan. "Jesus Loves me, This I know" is one song she loves and sings it to the same melody we do. She enjoys her video of the Sudanese choir singing in their white robes with large red crosses on the front. She has made our church home and loves our pastors' John and Kris. Nyanhial is the youngest in the family who became Christians under the teaching of a Covenant Missionary, James Tang. She attended school at the church he led. Nyanhial learned to love and trust Jesus through his teaching and her Christian parents. She loved to sing in the choir when she was only five years old, and never missed church.

James Tang became a missionary in 2006 and still continues his ministry there. In the Covenant Companion (Nov/Dec 2017 page 42-44) a story titled *GRACE IN A TIME OF BLOOD-SHED* describes how he and a fellow missionary, Matthew Jock Moses , whose family also has suffered from the violence, have led training programs called Peace Reconciliation and Healing . Todate, 4,000 South Sudanese in seven refugee camps from more than twenty tribes have been trained as ambassadors of peace.



- Q. How much money is available from the Stag sale?
- A. \$38,868
- Q. What are the average monthly utility costs?
- A. The current owners answered with the following email: "The problem with our average utility bills is that we have it set at 55 all winter and 80 all summer because no one is there. Under that scenario, the cost is about \$150 per month (WPU and Minnesota Energy...they both combined cover gas, electric, water, sewer, garbage and recycling). With someone living there full time, of course, it would be higher, but I don't know by how much."
